The new challenges in psychiatry

When we began working on this conference by October 2019, the world was as normal as it could be, that is of course, if we see climate change, wars and terrorist incidences as normal.

We began working towards an inclusive conference where the researchers (senior and junior) clinicians and medical students would come together and present their research, share their experiences and knowledge, but most importantly enjoy the charm of Belgian town of Mons and of course learn from each other.

Then came along, totally out of blue, Covid-19 virus which began in China, but soon spread far wide all over the world turning into a pandemic, causing devastating effects on number of European countries such as Italy, Spain, France and UK. With Belgium being no exception, the months from March to May 2020 were particularly dark, with widespread unimaginable fear and lockdowns that were never seen before with possible exception being the times of the Spanish Flu, 1st and 2nd World Wars.

However, despite lockdowns, for many, work continued in the virtual world, utilising modern means of communications. As has been the case with supplements from our past sister conferences (Cambridge Biennial International Conference on Mental Health, Cambridge, UK and mental health conference organised by Centro Studi Psichiatrici - Psychiatric Studies Centre) supplements, we have tried to make this conference supplement scientific and yet as eclectic as possible.

The papers in this conference Supplement of Psychiatria Danubina include, contributions from not only senior researchers, young rising researchers, but also clinicians as well as medical students who are having their first stab at research and publishing. We also believe contribution from young researchers and medical student is important in keeping the future of research and continued building of knowledge with regards to mental health alive, thus benefiting mentally ill and the humanity. This makes this scientific journal truly inclusive and unique.

This Supplement includes papers covering wide variety research from Belgium, Brazil, Croatia, Ireland, Italy, Qatar, Russia, Switzerland and UK.
